- 1 Reaffirming IUSY’s commitment to social justice, democracy, international solidarity,
- 2 and the dignity of peoples, and recognizing climate change as one of the greatest
- 3 political, social, and economic challenges of our time;
  
- 4 Affirming that climate change is not only an environmental crisis, but a profound
- 5 injustice that disproportionately affects the Global South, despite its minimal
- 6 contribution to historical greenhouse gas emissions;
  
- 7 Deeply alarmed by the accelerating impacts of climate change across Africa, the
- 8 Middle East, Latin America, Asia, and Small Island Developing States, including
- 9 extreme heat, droughts, floods, desertification, food insecurity, water scarcity, public
- 10 health crises, and forced displacement;
  
- 11 Recognizing that these impacts threaten peace, democratic stability, and social
- 12 cohesion and act as a multiplier of inequality, conflict, and migration in already
- 13 vulnerable societies;
  
- 14 Noting the outcomes of the most recent United Nations Climate Change Conference
- 15 (COP30) and acknowledging efforts to strengthen adaptation, resilience, and
- 16 international cooperation;
  
- 17 Stressing, however, that current global climate commitments and outcomes remain
- 18 insufficient, unjust, and structurally imbalanced, placing a disproportionate burden on
- 19 the Global South while allowing major historical emitters to delay meaningful
- 20 responsibility;



21 Deeply concerned that climate finance commitments continue to fall far short of the real  
22 needs of developing countries, remain largely non-binding unpredictable, and are too  
23 often delivered in the form of loans that exacerbate debt and undermine sovereignty;

24 Alarmed by the absence of binding commitments on the rapid phase-out of fossil fuels,  
25 despite their central role in driving climate catastrophe, thereby exposing Global South  
26 communities to escalating and irreversible damage;

27 Recognizing that mechanisms addressing loss and damage, while long overdue,  
28 remain underfunded, inadequately operationalized, and disconnected from the principle  
29 of historical responsibility;

30 Affirming that climate action without justice, equity, and accountability cannot deliver  
31 real solutions, and that adaptation alone cannot compensate for continued inaction on  
32 emissions by the world's largest polluters;

33 Emphasizing that youth, workers, rural communities, women, and indigenous peoples  
34 in the Global South are not passive victims of the climate crisis but key actors in  
35 building just, democratic, and sustainable alternatives;

36 Therefore, we resolve to:

37 Affirm climate justice as a central pillar of peace, democracy, and social justice, and  
38 reject any approach that treats the climate crisis as a technical or charitable issue  
39 rather than a political responsibility;

40 Demand binding and adequate climate finance for the Global South, prioritizing grants  
41 over loans, ensuring predictability, accessibility, and transparency, and placing  
42 adaptation and resilience at the center of international commitments;

43 Call for the full and urgent operationalization of loss and damage mechanisms, with  
44 substantial and regular contributions that reflect historical responsibility and respond to  
45 the real and immediate needs of affected communities;

46 Reject climate policies that deepen debt, dependency, or new forms of extraction, and  
47 call for reforms of the international financial architecture to free developing countries  
48 from choosing between climate survival and economic collapse;

49 Insist on a just transition that guarantees decent work, social protection, food  
50 sovereignty, energy access, and public services, while preventing the transfer of  
51 environmental costs to the Global South under the guise of green growth,



- 52 Demand accelerated and binding action to reduce emissions, including a rapid and  
53 equitable phase-out of fossil fuels, in line with scientific evidence and the principle of  
54 common but differentiated responsibilities;
- 55 Assert the central role of youth in climate governance, decision-making, and  
56 implementation, and support youth-led initiatives that strengthen community resilience  
57 and democratic participation;
